Peace and Goodness! Once again we are celebrating the single most significant event in Christian history, the Easter event! Everything everywhere seems ready to burst forth in its fullness. As we attend Easter services we will hear the familiar and comforting story of Jesus' resurrection.

As we recall, Jesus was laid in an unused tomb which was sealed by a large stone rolled in front of the entranceway. I would like to draw our attention to that stone. From scripture, we know that it was large and heavy as it took an earthquake to move it. We also know from scripture that it was placed to prevent the theft of Jesus' body.

It also represents the attempt to bring to an end any hope that Jesus would rise, that his renegade followers would disperse and the "Good News" would never be preached. In the crucifixion story, we see a culture-wide rejection of good and truth; which leads to a horrific injustice. However, it is tempting for us to fail to see how this story of injustice and scape-goating is alive and well today, in our own cities and towns.

In our society that stone comes in many shapes and sizes, including personal size. Each of us has ample opportunity daily to put our own interests before someone else's thereby protecting our own needs and sense of power. Each of us makes choices as we participate in society that sometimes supports social structures which in turn prohibit others from becoming self-determining participants in society. In doing so we not only roll a stone between each other but between ourselves and God as well.

An inability to fully participate in society and be self-determinate often causes people to fall prey to feelings of helplessness and disempowerment. It is then that the stones of despair and feeling useless gather with stones of substance abuse, codependency, selfishness, materialism and others to create a stifling and oppressive wall.

Yet, through his resurrection Jesus gave to the world an inextinguishable light! In this season of resurrection and the rolling away of stones, we invite you to let something diesomething that will rise in new form. Let a tendency to criticize die into a habit of praise; let a tendency to disbelieve die into a vision of hope and possibility; let a tendency to tell your side of the story die into a desire to listen deeply to another's story; let a tendency to take care of your own needs before the needs of others die into radical acts of charity.

The Risen Christ continues to call us, therefore, we will continue to help our poor brothers and sisters roll away the stones in their lives. As we do, each one of you will also be remembered with gratitude and in prayer for your part in the ongoing support of our outreach to the poor.



The Capuchin Outreach program provides direct service and supportive advocacy to those who are in need. Services offered include: housing, personal budgeting, community service referrals, and pastoral counseling.
